Please stay on trails and only take pictures.

How many chipmunk holes can you find on your hike? Chipmunks help disperse seeds throughout the forest. Can you hear any of them calling with their high pitched "CHIP"?





Look for a Mourning Cloak Butterfly.

These butterflies spend the winter in their adult state hibernating under rocks and wood piles.

Find a plant that has buds on it. Buds are the first stage of development for a leaf, flower, or shoot.







Find a tree stump where you can see the rings.

Each dark ring indicates a year: the more space between the rings the more the tree grew that year.

Look for Mining Bee homes, they look like little volcanoes in the dirt.
These bees are not aggressive and typically don't sting, they live underground, and help pollinate our plants.





Listen for Birds, you will need to be quiet for this.

Try to get a picture of a bird or a recording of a call and we can ID it for you.

Find a Mushroom and try to draw it.

Mushrooms are not plants or animals - they are part of their own kingdom: Fungi.
